Ukrainian Women of Ravensbrück Concentration Camp by Kalyna Bezchlibnyk-Butler (Solonynka) and Lydia Replansky

Two presenters spoke at this webinar about the Ukrainian women prisoners of the Ravensbrück Concentration Camp as documented in the bilingual (Ukrainian-English) book "Ukrainian women of Ravensbrück concentration camp: voices of prisoners / Українські жінки концтабору Равенсбрюк: голоси в'язнів".



Our November speakers Kalyna Bezchlibnyk-Butler and Lydia Replansky

The first presenter, Kalyna Bezchlibnyk-Butler (Solonynka) described how she became involved in researching Ukrainian women prisoners who were incarcerated at the Ravensbrück Concentration Camp during the Second World War. She became interested in this story from family documents and continued her research at the Ukrainian Canadian Research and Documentation Centre and at various libraries and archives in Toronto. In this slide presentation, Kalyna provided a brief description of the Ravensbrück Camp and its prisoners, gave an overview of the contents

of the book including copies of prisoner registration and transfer documents, maps, and illustrations. She described the day-to-day life in the Camp and read quotes from individual prisoners about their experiences.

She talked about methods and sources used to compile the text as well as examples from a database of the Ukrainian prisoners. Kalyna is planning a further study of all Ukrainian political prisoners in Germany during the Second World War.

The second presenter, Lydia Replansky, spoke about her mother, Olha Froliak-Eliashevsky and her incarceration as a political prisoner in Nazi prisons and the Ravensbrück Concentration Camp from December 11, 1943 to April 5, 1945.

She began her presentation with a biographical note on her mother and the story of her mother's arrest on December 11, 1943 during her studies at the University of Vienna. Her mother was arrested as a suspected member of the Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists and for aiding the Ukrainian underground. Lydia described the interrogations of her mother by the German Gestapo, her incarceration in the Camp, the daily Camp routines, and forced labour at the Siemens factory making electrical components for the German war effort.

Lydia's slide presentation included maps, photographs, and illustrations of prison uniforms and insignia. Her mother was released in April, 1945 at the end of the war and eventually immigrated to Toronto. Lydia's mother did not speak about her incarceration in the Camp but later in life, she wrote her memoirs and provided interviews recorded at the Multicultural History Society of Ontario and the Ukrainian Canadian Research and Documentation Centre.
