April 22, 2014 Meeting

'Writing a Family Story'

At the April 22, 2014 meeting, Mary Borsky gave a presentation entitled, *Writing a Family Story*. Mary has published several books and many articles in the field of children's, young adult and adult literature and she is well known among Canadian short story writers. Mary was invited to speak to our members and encourage them to write their family history.

She began her presentation with a short description of her Ukrainian family experiences living in northern Alberta. Mary mentioned that, like many other authors, she has based some of her stories on examples from her own family. Regarding the inclusion of family secrets in a family history, Mary advised that this depends on the planned audience for the family history and the sensitivity of the author to the possible reactions from other family members.

When writing a family history, she stated that it may be a good idea to include details about family members such as personal habits, odd mannerisms, anecdotes, hobbies, and other details that can bring these individuals to life. These personal details are usually lost after the individuals have passed away including those family members that remembered them. Mary mentioned that it is possible to write family stories but only for the benefit of the author and not show them to anyone. Once all the segments have been written, it may be possible to find a common theme to unite the stories. Stories may be written by hand, by typewriter or by computer depending on the preferences and skill of the author. A family history may also be written in the form of letters. Again, Mary stressed the importance of details to make a story interesting. She also mentioned some of the options when planning to publish a family history.

Surname distribution maps

Sometimes it is possible to guess where a surname originated through surname distribution maps. These maps graphically display locations where surnames occurred at different periods in time. This strategy provides genealogists with a starting point for research in the birth country, when that information cannot be discovered through sources recorded in the new country of settlement. It works particularly well for lesscommon surnames and among families that have stayed in the same European locations for centuries. On this site, information can be located in Canada, Poland, the Czech Republic and many other countries.
