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# Oct 25 2016 Meeting

From Rosthern, Saskatchewan to Stalag Luft III, the Bill Markowsky Story

At the October meeting, we viewed the illustrated presentation, *From Rosthern, Saskatchewan to Stalag Luft III, the Bill Markowsky Story*. An earlier version of this presentation was prepared by Jars Balan and was viewed at a conference in Calgary in May, 2016. This story dealt with the life and career of Bill Markowsky in the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) during the Second World War.

It documents his early years in the Ukrainian community in Saskatchewan, his enlistment in the RCAF and his pilot training. The story continues with photos of his service in North Africa. to Italy, Germany and finally to Stalag Luft III in occupied Poland. It was at this POW Camp that the Great Escape took place but Bill was not part of this escape plan. Daily life in the POW Camp was illustrated with drawings and Bill kept notes on the Camp routine, food and contents of Red Cross parcels. He survived the war and returned to Saskatchewan where he married and raised his family.

This presentation is important for family history researchers with relatives who were POWs because it mentions various correspondence and organizations that documented the experiences of Canadian POWs during the Second World War. Telegrams from Ottawa to families of POWs, Christmas greetings from the Prime Minister to the POWs, official correspondence and related material provide a chronology that may assist in the research and writing of the experiences of a Canadian POW during the Second World War. The fact that the Markowsky family kept these documents since the war make them especially valuable and they should be preserved in an archives.

Emma Nahaylo, Bill Markowsky's granddaughter, who flew in from Saskatchewan, attended this meeting and saw this presentation for the first time. She later visited the Canadian War Museum and the Canadian Aviation Museum to view exhibits about the RCAF and the Second World War.

# <u>Orysia Tracz</u>

Orysia Paszczak Tracz was born on September 8, 1945 in a displaced person's camp in Berchtesgaden, Bavaria. She was raised in New Jersey, and made her family home in Winnipeg. Orysia met her husband Myroslaw in New York State and they married in 1967. They moved to Winnipeg in 1968.

Orysia's love and knowledge of Ukrainian traditions, ethnography, and song, were central to her life and career. She was a writer, researcher, lecturer, translator, and storyteller, and her activities spanned the globe, from Australia, throughout Canada, the US and Ukraine. Orysia visited Ottawa and made a presentation to the Ukrainian Genealogy Group on May 26, 2009, entitled, "Songs Your Mother Should Never Have Taught You".

For several years, she guided group tours to Ukraine where she assisted Ukrainian Canadians to visit their ancestral villages, conduct genealogical research and meet Ukrainian folk artists. Last year, she published "The First Star I See Tonight", a collection of her articles on Ukrainian Christmas traditions - the first of what was to be many books on why Ukrainians do "The Things We Do." She left a legacy of Ukrainian stories, songs, rituals, and traditions. Orysia passed away on November 10, 2016 in Winnipeg.

## **Bud Semchuk**

Bohdan (Bud) Carl Semchuk passed away on October 12, 2016. Bud attended several meetings of the Ukrainian Genealogy Group in previous years. His ancestors came from the Brody region of Ukraine and he had traveled to Ukraine. He was an active member of the Knights of Columbus and the St. John the Baptist Ukrainian Catholic Parish.
