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B/Gen. Joseph R. Romanow

Gen. Romanow gave our group a very interesting presentation on September 23, 2003 on the research, writing and publication of his family history. He concluded his presentation with a list of Do's and Don'ts for writing a family story:

Do:

- Select and write about real events as seen from your perspective
- Provide quotes by persons to give an insight to their character
- Capitalize on the memories of family members, relatives and friends
- Include maps to fix geographical locations
- Insert photos to provide physical reality; old photos are great
- Be honest, factual and non-judgemental
- Use the National Archives of Canada and other sources for passenger lists
- Seek out headstones on family and relatives graves
- Search for family Naturalization Applications and Naturalization Certificates

Don'ts

- Do not fictionalize, romanticize or enhance people or events
- Do not give your opinion of a person. Write about what they did or said to illustrate character

- Do not omit unflattering events concerning a person if they are significant aspects of their character. Integrity is important
- Do not suppress humour.

STUDY ON THE ADAPTATION OF SECOND-GENERATION UKRAINIANS

Olena Piaseckyj, a doctoral student at the School of Psychology, University of Ottawa, is looking for 300 Canadians of Ukrainian descent to participate in a study on the adaptation of second-generation Ukrainians living in Ottawa. Second-generation Ukrainians are individuals whose parents immigrated to Canada as adults, as a result of WWII.

The purpose of the anonymous survey is to gain a better understanding of the cultural and psycho-social integration of Ukrainians in Canada. The survey takes 45 min. to an hour and is multiple choice. It asks you questions about your desire to maintain your heritage culture and to participate in the Canadian culture, as well as about your integration in Canadian society, feelings about yourself, your social relationships and your values.

Bank of Canada

Researchers interested in Ukrainian family history have a large number of web sites to investigate in the search for family members and distant relatives. One site that may provide not only some family history information but also some financial benefits. This is the Bank of Canada web site. http://www.bankofcanada.ca/

According to current information, if a bank account has not been active for over ten years and the depositor cannot be located, the account is transferred to the Bank of Canada and listed in Unclaimed Bank Balances. On the Bank of Canada home page, this information, answers to frequently asked questions

and the procedures to claim the bank balances are included.

On the lower left of the Home Page you will notice, *Unclaimed Bank Balances*. After clicking on this button, you will notice on the next page a *Search* button. After clicking on *Search*, the next page includes an entry box for *Individual or organization name*. In this box you can enter your own family name or the names of your relatives. For example, enter 'Ukrainian' or 'Ukranian' and about a dozen organizations are listed. This information includes the name and location of the bank and the last date the account was active.

Instructions on claiming bank accounts are also included. The Genealogy Group would be interested in stories about any efforts by our members to successfully locate and claim a bank balance.

October Meeting Speaker: Ron Sorobey

Ron Sorobey was educated at the University of Manitoba where he was active in Ukrainian student organizations. He has been working in Ottawa for many years at the Canada Customs and Revenue Agency. In 1995 Ron began his research on the life and career of Philip Konowal. He was able to contact the surviving members of Konowal's family in the Ottawa area and conducted long and difficult research at the National Archives, various libraries and other institutions. Ron has also used his contacts as a former officer in the Cameron Highlanders of Canada to further his research. Through his efforts and those of other members of the Ukrainian community, he was instrumental in arranging for a military tombstone to be placed on Konowal's grave

at the Notre Dame Cemetery by Veterans Affairs Canada. Memorial plaques were also placed at the Cartier Square Drill Hall on July 15, 1996 and later at other locations in Toronto and New Westminister, British Columbia. Ron has published a number of booklets and articles on Konowal and had also prepared a small exhibit.

Through his research and writing, Ron has revived interest in Philip Konowal's life and career. Ron remains an active member of the Ukrainian Professional and Business Association and the Knights of Columbus. For his work at the Canada Customs and Revenue Agency, he was awarded the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal.
