6th Annual Giant Used Book Sale by the Friends of the National Library of Canada on September 29, 30 and October 1,2000 at the Carlingwood Shopping Centre. In previous years there were books and periodicals on eastern Europe including Ukraine and Ukrainian-Canadian subjects.

Edmonton's Ukrainian Shumka Dancers mark their 41st anniversary with their first national tour in five years. They will appear at the National Arts Centre on October 19th, with their interpretation of Cinderella. "I want the audience to be transported into the story of Cinderella, her love, her quest, and lose themselves in a tale unfolding through the language of Ukrainian dance," said Gordon Gordey, artistic director. "From the moment the first note sounds, we want you to enter the fascinating world of Cinderella - Shumka style." Choreographers from Ukraine and Canada have created a new musical score blending Ukrainian folk instruments with a classical sound. And, of course, audiences will be treated to the signature whirlwind style of the 55 member dance company.

Upcoming Project

We have received permission from the Notre Dame Cemetery to access their records for the Ukrainian section and transcribe them to a database. Our objective is to match these records with the information on the headstones and publish this information for genealogical purposes. This project will hopefully take place in October. We are also looking to identify the other cemeteries where Ukrainians are buried and include them at a later date.

Submissions for Publication

We are now actively soliciting information for publication during the coming year. Although we have not formalised any policy yet, it is hoped that we will be able to publish relevant genealogical information during the year in order to be timely, and consolidate any of these publications for the next annual report.

Among the headings, will be "heads up" or "quick tips". This should be about 1/4 of a page long and can be information about anything from a new publication to a new (or previously hidden) source of genealogical information. "Remembrances" will include stories of growing up Ukrainian or in a certain town and will generally be up to two pages in length. "Resources" will include undocumented publications and URLs. We encourage everyone to submit their information.

We especially want to include new material and documentation from the National Capital Region.

Proposed Executive / Committee

These are some of the functions that we are proposing for an executive. Some of these functions would not necessarily be part of the executive, and some might be combined.

Chair/President - head of organisation, overall running of meetings, etc.

Vice-Chair/President - acts for president.

Accommodations - make arrangements for the accommodation, deal exclusively with ensuring that the accommodations are available for each meeting. Check out and arrange for any necessary equipment, rentals, etc for any other events such as Gene-O-Rama.

Treasurer - will collect and disburse funds, keep records according to accepted Canadian accounting standards.

Membership - maintain a list and undertake activities to increase membership as well as liaison with other genealogy groups

Phone Notification - call those members who are not on eMail to notify them about meetings and special events. This person should be on email, so that they could get the information.

Librarian - be responsible for setting up our resource centre, acquiring publications thru exchanges with other groups, acknowledging receipt of publications, etc.

Ukrainian-Brazilian Thanksgiving Tip

Serve pyrohy with pan-fried pirana!

Kobassa Stew

a recipe from the old country - Winnipeg

Preparation time: 20 min Cooking time: 30 min

Makes: 4 to 6 servings

125g (1/4 lb) strips of bacon

2 onions coarsely chopped

2 Tbl all-purpose flour

3 cups beef bouillon or stock

500g (1 lb) kobassa, skinned and cut into 2.5 cm slices

2 large carrots, cut into 5 cm strips
2 large parsnips, peeled and sliced into
rounds

1/2 turnip, peeled and coarsely cubed 1/2 tsp leaf thyme

Freshly ground black pepper ½ cabbage, cut into small wedges 1/4 cup chopped parsley (optional)

Cut bacon into 2.5 cm pieces. Cook over medium heat in a large heavy bottomed saucepan until crisp. Remove with a slotted spoon to a separate dish and set aside. Add onions to fat remaining in pan and sauté until soft, about 5 minutes. Remove to dish containing bacon. Whisk flour into fat in pan. Add a little butter or oil if need. Then gradually whisk in bouillon until blended. Continue cooking over medium heat until thickened and smooth, about 5 minutes. Then return bacon and onion to pan along with sausage, carrots, parsnips, turnip and seasonings. Stir together until combined and bring to a boil. Then cover, reduce heat to

medium-low and cook for 10 minutes. Stir occasionally. Then immerse cabbage wedges in stew, cover and continue cooking until vegetables are tender, about 10 more minutes. Sprinkle with chopped parsley just before serving.

Stew can be made ahead and refrigerated for a day. Because of the cabbage, it does not freeze well. Simply reheat and serve.

About 389 calories per serving.
